# New Pennsylvania Child Protective Services Laws

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania passed new Child Protection Laws that went into effect on December 31, 2014. The new laws redefine what child abuse is and who is considered a perpetrator. The law changes also outline the persons or officials required to report child abuse (a mandatory reporter) and the criminal charges for failure to act by mandatory reporters.

The definition of Child Abuse will be "A recent act or failure to an act committed intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly against a child by a perpetrator that causes or creates a reasonable likelihood of bodily injury; serious mental injury or physical neglect; sexual abuse or exploitation, and/or death."

Child abuse also occurs if a perpetrator fabricates, feigns, exaggerates or induces a child's medical symptoms; kicks, bites, throws, burns, stabs, or cuts a child; unreasonably restrains or confines a child; forcefully shakes, slaps, or strikes an infant; interferes with a child's breathing; causes a child to be present at a meth lab; and/or leaves a child unsupervised with a registered sex offender that is not the child's parent.

Changes to the definition of a perpetrator also went into effect with the new laws. A perpetrator is now defined as "A parent of the child, a spouse or former spouse of the child's parents; someone 14 years or older responsible for the child's welfare or lives with the child; or someone 18 years or older not living with the child including grandparents, great grandparents, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, grandchildren, and great grandchildren."

Mandatory reporters shall immediately report abuse to ChildLine or an additional alternative electronic reporting mechanism. Failure to do so results in the mandatory reporter *continued on page 5*

#### Cyber Bullying: Understand the Cyber Risks Children Face

Bullying used to be on playgrounds, in schools, or on school buses. Cyber bullying gives bullies new ways to bully other children at school <u>and</u> at home. Bullies can use cell phones and other electronic devices to harass others using text messaging or vicious emails. Cyber bullies create web sites to post stories, pictures, or jokes that ridicule others, as well as "hi-jack" email addresses to harass others under someone else's name or email address (placing blame on otherwise, innocent children).

Children learn about computers and the internet at much younger ages today both at home and at school. The audience can be much larger and the issues are no longer private. All children regardless of age or gender are susceptible to cyber bullying and in many cases, emotional and mental abuse from a cyber bully can cause much more damage to children than traditional bullying.

Protect your children, monitor electronic devices, keep them secure, and watch out for the potential cyber bully!

#### **Internet Safety Tips for Parents to Review with Kids**

- Remember "Stranger, Danger!" Never agree to meet; tell a trusted adult if asked to meet an online "friend".
- Tell your parents right away if someone (especially someone met online) tells you "don't tell your parents".
- Do not post photos of yourself, friends, or family online. Bad people can use the photos in bad ways.
- Email, chats and instant messaging are used best if messages are short, polite and respectful!
- You can't see or hear people online; they may be lying about who they are or what they want..
- Tell an adult you trust if you see something on the internet that makes you uncomfortable.
- Everything on the internet is public; don't think "private" information is actually private!
- Don't use attachments from emails received from people you don't know.
- Don't give out personal information to someone you meet online.
- Only allow "friends" access to profiles, sites, or blogs.
- Don't say something online you wouldn't say to a person.
- Don't respond to emails from people you don't know.
- Don't SHOUT (use all capital letters) when you type.
- Talk to parents if asked for personal information online.
- Don't accept gifts from someone met online.
- Avoid "adult only" web sites

In today's society, kids use technology to communicate quickly, without using sentences or proper grammar. Parents may find the coded communication hard to understand. The below messages are examples of what you might find when checking a child's cell phone:

Just checkin' in-- Sup! CD9 tho, PIR, PAL, and PAW. GEEZ! Now PLOS so NAGI...whew, 99! We gotta KPC and this P&C! RU/18? WTTP or ?^?? I'd love to MIRL 'cause I think 143

Lemme no DOC, 420 or CID for fun at 1174'--Most Def need 2 no—no need 2 get BROKEN, KWIM?

Parents, don't feel helpless; be informed; act quickly; and know what children possibly "say."

Crossroads served 1,295 domestic violence victims between July 2013 and June 2014 in Clearfield and Jefferson Counties. Victims were provided with 4,373 hours of counseling and/or advocacy, 1,802 nights of emergency shelter, and 12 individuals received relocation assistance. Of these victims, 758 were new adult victims, 353 were children, and 184 were friends or family members affected by violence. committing a misdemeanor of the second degree if they willfully fail to make the report. The offense may be graded a felony of the third degree if the abuse constitutes a felony of the first degree or higher and/or the mandated reporter has direct knowledge of the nature of the abuse.

The law states all of the following adults must make a report if they have reasonable cause to suspect a child is an abuse victim:

- Licensed health professionals, medical examiners, coroners, or funeral directors
- Most health care facility employees and emergency medical service providers
- School or child care service employees and religious and spiritual leaders
- Social Service staff with direct contact with children and peace officers or law enforcement officials
- Paid or unpaid individuals involved with a routinely scheduled program, activity, or service for children

It is also classified as a second degree felony to intimidate, retaliate, or obstruct any reporter, victim, or witness from making a report, from withholding information, documentation, testimony, or evidence and/or failing to appear at, or participate in, a child abuse proceeding or meeting.
