A special thanks to our board, staff, and partners who make our work and successes possible.





2007 Self-Sufficiency Award Nominee



Before coming to Community Action, Inc.'s Comprehensive Self Sufficiency (CSS) Program in October 2007, Dana Maxwell was going through a self-initiated drug and alcohol recovery program and needed help finding employment and encouragement to stay sober. Since Dana lost his driver's license due to a DUI, he knew maintaining his sobriety would be a key factor to having a successful future. With help from his case manager, Dana immediately began

searching for employment both on his own and by following up on every job lead provided through the CSS Program. Dana also needed to obtain his driver's license so he began that process.

In November 2007, Dana's case manager gave him a job lead which ultimately led to a full-time job paying \$10 per hour. Dana accepted the position but since he did not have a driver's license, he relied on friends and family to get to and from work. A job requirement included having steel-toed boots and cover-alls. Dana did not have the funds, so Community Action, Inc. used a donation to purchase these items so Dana could begin his employment.

In February 2008, Dana had maintained employment for 90 days, but told his case manager he wanted to pursue other employment opportunities. In March 2008, Dana accepted a job with a different employer. During the transition between jobs, the only assistance Dana requested was for food. Later in March, Dana was finally able to obtain his driver's license and began driving to and from work without help from family and friends.

In May 2008, Dana and his girlfriend moved to reduce household expenses. The move decreased utility bills and shortened Dana's commute to work. Once Dana and his girlfriend were settled, he continued his search for better employment. Dana's continued determination paid off when he took a job in June 2008 that allowed him to regain his CDL license and obtain employer-paid benefits.

Dana says, "Sometimes you get a second chance at life; Community Action, Inc. gave me the help and encouragement I needed to go after it."

Community Partners - the Key to Our Success

Twenty-four families in Clarion County had a better Thanksgiving thanks to the efforts of Clarion University of Pennsylvania's Eagle Ambassadors' Donate-A-Meal program. The Eagle Ambassadors, which supports the activities of the Clarion University Alumni Relations Office, started the fundraiser nine years ago in hopes of obtaining food for the holidays for needy families in the area.

Donate-A-Meal gives Clarion students with meal plans a chance to help the Clarion community. Students sign up to donate a meal from their meal plan and the value of all the meals donated are then tallied. The total dollar value of the meals donated is used by Chartwells Dining Services, Clarion University's food service provider, to purchase turkeys and potatoes.

"We try to help the community in any way that we can, and this is a great way to get students involved as well," said Holly Nolan, Eagle Ambassador Vice President and Chair of the Community Service Committee.

This year 309 students donated a meal resulting in 24 turkeys being donated. Jeff Gauger, Director of Food Services for Chartwells, delivered the turkeys

wells, delivered the turkeys to the Clarion County Food Bank a week prior to Thanksgiving.

"Twenty-four more families had a better Thanksgiving thanks to this effort," said Aimee Cotherman, Community Action Inc.'s Self-Sufficiency Coordinator. Aimee reported Community Action provided help to 200 families for Thanksgiving, including those who receive a voucher to purchase their own turkey.

Success Stories

Steve, a 33 year old veteran, worked temporary jobs while coping with a disability.

As his finances dwindled, he stayed in places not intended for human habitation. Steve entered our men's shelter where he worked with his case manager on job readiness and obtaining transportation and housing. Within 4 months of acquiring permanent employment, Steve was able to rent an apartment.

James was disabled and unable to work. He had no income and was living in a tent for 3 months when he came to Community Action, Inc. for help. He worked with his case manager to find suitable housing and apply for Social Security Disability benefits.

Success Story

Jane, a single mother of four children, was unemployed, in debt, received no child support, did not have childcare, and since she could not afford her own home, was living with her sister. Jane first sought aid from the County Assistance Office who referred her to our Work Ready Program. Immediately, Jane's case manager helped her prepare a resume and cover letter and improve her interview skills. Jane was also referred to our Child Care Information Services Project where she was approved for subsidized child care enabling her to accept an employment offer. To further improve her family's life, Jane searched for a better job and place to live. Eventually, Jane was offered a job with a personal care facility, a job she knew would be very meaningful. Jane received housing assistance and located a new home for her family. Jane reported she never dreamt she could accomplish her goals in such a short time. Being able to pay her bills and having her own home has given Jane a great feeling of control in her life. Jane continues to pursue her dream of opening her own cleaning business.

Local Volunteer Receives State Volunteer of the Year Award

Marlene Fike was named Pennsylvania Senior Corps-RSVP Volunteer of the Year in the Disaster Preparedness/Relief category. Marlene has been a Senior Corps-RSVP volunteer since December of 2006. During the period April 2007 through March 2008, Marlene volunteered 1,197 hours for the Clearfield-Jefferson American Red Cross.

Marlene, a registered nurse who left active nursing due to health related issues, joined the Senior Corps-RSVP and became an active volunteer with the Clearfield-Jefferson American Red Cross as a part of the Disaster Action Team (DAT). The DAT responds to local emergencies such as house fires, natural disasters and other emergencies. Marlene is also a member of the Disaster Relief Operations (DRO) and has been deployed to assist with disasters across the country. In August of 2007, Marlene was deployed for eight days to DeCelle, Illinois to assist tornado and flood victims. In October 2007, Marlene was deployed ten days to San Diego serving as a nurse supervisor to assist fire victims. Marlene also teaches monthly CPR/AED and First Aid classes for the Clearfield-Jefferson American Red Cross. In addition to her volunteer duties for the Red Cross, Marlene volunteers for Toys for Tots, Angel Food Ministries, Lambs Harvest Food Pantry and the Senior Corps-RSVP Pen Pal Program.

Billy started the New Choices-New
Options (NC-NO) Project with the hopes of finding
a job and a career. As a dislocated worker struggling
with chemical dependency, Billy had been to rehab and
was finally on the right path. Billy's goals were to find
employment and permanent housing with the intent to have
regular visits from his children. Billy completed NC-NO and
discovered he was suited for a nontraditional career as an
Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN). Through NC-NO, Community
Action, Inc. helped fund medical terminology and phlebotomy
classes for Billy at Clarion County Career Center so he would
be prepared to enter LPN school. While participating in
NC-NO classes, Billy found permanent
housing and his children are
planning a visit.

Success Story

When Amy called Child Care
Information Services (CCIS), she and her husband
Mark were struggling with numerous issues. Mark was
self-employed, but had trouble with the IRS. Amy reported
since relocating to our area and finding jobs, their finances were
starting to improve. However, both Amy and Mark were working
minimum wage jobs and needed help paying for child care. With the
help of CCIS, Amy's was able to increase her work hours and they
worked their way out of debt. The couple discussed starting a new
business again. They had learned from their prior mistakes and
were determined to do things the right way this time. Amy
credits CCIS with helping the family to start over.

Energy Saving Tips

Electricity

- Unplug appliances when not in use.
- Turn off TV and stereo when not using.
- Turn off lights when leaving a room.
- Replace bulbs with energy efficient compact fluorescent bulbs or LED bulbs.
- Use lids on saucepans to conserve heat.
- Use microwave to reheat food or drinks.
- Unplug coffee pot after coffee is brewed, reheat in
- · microwave.
- Air dry dishes in dishwasher after washing cycle.
- Keep water bed covered with comforters.





Appliances


- Keep coils clean on refrigerator and freezer.
- Allow hot foods to cool completely before placing in refrigerator or freezer.
- Thaw foods in the refrigerator.
- Keep freezers ¾ full.
- Do not open refrigerator door more than necessary.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer away from heat ducts.
- Empty lint filter on dryer every load.
- Line dry clothes when possible.
- Buy energy efficient appliances.

Water

- Take 5 minute showers.
- Utilize water saving shower heads and faucet aerators.
- Repair leaking faucets.
- Lower water temperature to 120 degrees; 140 degrees if using a dishwasher.
- Shut off water while brushing teeth or shaving.
- Wash laundry in cold or warm water and rinse in cold water.
- Fill basin with water to rinse dishes instead of running water.
- Wash full loads of laundry.







Heating and Cooling

- Turn thermostat down at night or when away for 3 or more hours.
- Open drapes on sunny days and close in the evening.
- Clean filters for furnaces and air conditioners once a month when in use.
- Use fans instead of air conditioners.
- Do not block radiators or baseboard heaters with furniture or drapes.
- Do not open outside doors more than necessary. Close doors quickly.
- <u>DO NOT</u> use your oven to heat your home.
- Wear appropriate clothing for the weather.

Success Story

Jack and his girlfriend, parents of infant twins, came to Community Action, Inc. to have their taxes done through our new VITA Project. Jack worked for a logging company and his girlfriend stayed home with the twins. The family was making a good living despite Jack only being 25 years old and the sole provider. However, their budget was still tight. While preparing their taxes, Community Action, Inc. staff found them eligible for more than \$5,000 in refunds, including the Earned Income Tax Credit. The family was thrilled with the welcome relief the extra money would bring to their lives, and they planned to payoff debt and perform household repairs. During 2007-2008 Community Action, Inc.'s VITA Project completed 336 tax returns and reached an additional 1,520 families through the project's Financial Literacy component.
